

What challenges does the Criminal Justice System Face?

- There are currently over 480,000 child pornography websites

Project Safe Childhood Report to Congress, 2010

- In 2003, the number of child pornography files found online was 3,600. By 2005, the number of child pornography files had exploded to 6.5 million

National Center for Missing and Exploited Children

- More than 60,000 images of child pornography posted online every month

Royal Canadian Mounted Police 2006

- In 2012 alone, upon the request of law enforcement, NCMEC analysts reviewed more than 19 million images and videos.

National Center for Missing and Exploited Children

Challenges Ctn.

- Law enforcement has identified 20 million unique leads of persons offering child pornography

Project Safe Childhood National Report to Congress, 2010

- Child pornography generates approximately \$3 billion annually


- Approximately 20% of all Internet pornography involves children






Myth: Child Pornography is Not Big in the US

On-line Enticement

- State and local law enforcement agencies involved in Internet Crimes Against Children Task Forces reported a 230 percent increase in the number of documented complaints of online enticement of children from 2004 to 2008.

National Center for Missing and Exploited Children

- 1 in 25 children ages 10 to 17 received an online sexual solicitation where the solicitor tried to make offline contact.

On-line Enticement



- ★ It is estimated approximately 750,000 “sexual predators” use the Internet in an attempt to make contact with children for the purpose of sexually exploiting them.

On-Line Sexual Exploitation of Children

- 80% of people identified with child pornography had images of children being sexually penetrated.
- 21% had images of children subjected to bondage, rape or torture. Most of these were gagged, bound, blindfolded or otherwise subjected to and enduring sadistic sex.

The abuse of the children is becoming more violent and sadistic


Law enforcement is now combating the problem of live webcams and streaming video

Recent Case (Milas)

Idaho's Child Exploitation Problem

- It is estimated that there are over 5,000 unique leads in Idaho disseminating child pornography images of children (2010).
- It is estimated that 34,000 Idaho children receive an Internet solicitation annually.
- 5,000 Idaho children are exploited by mail, calls or requests to meet in person.

"I've tried to stop, but I can't..."

Common quote from several on-line sex offenders

Hernandez/Bourke Study (2006)

- 40 out of 155 offenders had documented histories of abuse for a total of 75 victims: 1.88 victims per offender
- **85% admitted to at least one hands on offense**
- **13% denied molestation, and then failed a polygraph**
- **2% could honestly say they did not have any victims, but were looking for the chance**
- **A total of 1,777 victims were identified as having been sexually exploited that had never been identified**

Children Feel Intense Shame

In one study of confirmed child sex abuse cases:

79%

Of children denied or tentatively disclosed

22%

Of children who did disclose and who were victims eventually recanted

Effects of Child Sexual Abuse on Victims

- In the short term (up to two years), victims may exhibit regressive behaviors (e.g., thumb-sucking and bed-wetting in younger children), sleep disturbances, eating problems, behavior and/or performance problems at school, and unwillingness to participate in school or social activities
- Longer term effects may be wide-ranging, to include anxiety-related, self-destructive behaviors such as alcoholism or drug abuse, anxiety attacks, and insomnia

Effects of Child Sexual Abuse on Victims

- Distrust of adults
- Feeling of no where to turn

- Isolation from rest of family / friends

Effects of ICAC Crimes on Victims

- Because victims know images of their abuse are available in perpetuity they are subject to a greater long-term risk of depression, guilt, poor self-esteem, feelings of inferiority, interpersonal problems, delinquency, substance abuse, suicidal thoughts, and PTSD.

Osborne v. Ohio, 405 U.S. 103, 111 (1990)

- After the physical abuse has ended, child pornography victims suffer due to continued circulation of their images or the ongoing potential for circulation of their images

Reality Check

According to a 2007 by the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers:

63% Of Professionals Reported “little hope for a cure”

88% Of Professionals Fear “recidivism after treatment”

How Can We Protect Our Children

Safety Tips

Your child's best online protection is you

- Install and use online protection tools
- Become computer literate
- Keep the computer in a common area
- Bookmark you child's favorite site for easy access
- Find out what Internet safety is in place at locations your child spends time, ie - School, after-school center, friends homes

Safety Tips

- Warning signs of a child being targeted by an online predator include spending long hours online, especially at night, phone calls from people you don't know, or unsolicited gifts arriving in the mail
- If your child suddenly turns off the computer when you walk into the room, ask why and monitor computer time more closely
- Withdrawal from family life and reluctance to discuss online activities are other signs to watch for
- Monitor phone and credit card bills for unfamiliar charges

Safety Tips

- No entering private chat rooms; block them with safety features provided by your Internet service provider or with special filtering software.
- Be aware that posting messages to chat rooms can reveal your child's email address to others.

Safety Tips

Chat Room Caution

- Chat rooms pose serious hazards for kids. Many kids have met "friends" in chat rooms who were solely interested in exploiting them.
- No one knows how common chat-room predators are, but child sexual predators are known to frequent chat rooms.

Safety Tips

These predators sometimes prod their online acquaintances to exchange personal information, such as addresses and phone numbers, thus putting the kids they are chatting with – and their families – at risk.

Those interested in exploiting children often pose as teens or younger in chat rooms. Because many kids have been told by parents not to give out their home phone numbers, pedophiles may encourage kids to call them; with caller ID the offenders instantly have the kids' phone numbers.
